Message from Our Foundation President

Is Cape Canaveral Lighthouse a unique lighthouse or just a lighthouse? I think that it is unique for a few different reasons. Definition of Unique – one and only, single/ having no like or equal / highly unusual, extraordinary, rare.

Is it because of its age? Not really. Built in 1868 it is 155 years old this year, making it the fifteenth oldest lighthouse in Florida; however, it <u>is</u> the oldest facility on Cape Canaveral.

Is it because of its height? Again, not really. At 151 feet high it is the fourth tallest of the 30 lighthouses in Florida trailing only Ponce Inlet (175'), St Augustine (165') and Dry Tortugas Light (157'). It is also the sixteenth tallest of the over 700 lighthouses in the United States of American.

Is it because it is a Cast Iron lighthouse? Again, not really. According to Wikimedia there are 4 cast iron lighthouses in Florida (Cape Canaveral, Garden Key, Hillsboro Inlet, and Sand Key). It also states that there are 65 cast iron lighthouses in the USA. Included in the total of 65 are some lighthouses that only have cast iron as the window support in the lantern room.

Is it because it was built to be lived in? Again, not really. In Florida alone there are at least ten other lighthouses that have living quarters attached to the tower. (Pensacola, St. Marks, Cedar Key, and Port Boca Grande) or the living quarters are part of the structure (Fowey Rocks, Carysfort Reef, Alligator Reef, Sombrero Key, American Shoal, and Sand Key). Throughout the USA there are many lighthouses that are part of the house.

Is it because it was moved? Not really but getting closer. According to Dr. Sonny Witt Cape Canaveral was the third cast iron lighthouse to be moved. The 1852 Matagorda Island LH in Texas was moved in 1873, the 1875 Hunting Island LH in South Carolina was moved in 1889 and the Cape Canaveral LH was moved in 1893/1894. Since then I have found four more lighthouses that have been moved: In 1993 the Block Island Southeast Light was moved; in 1996 Cape Cod Light was mover; in 1999 Cape Hatteras Light was moved; and more recently Cape San Blas in Port St Joe was moved in 2014.

Is it because it is owned by the United States Space Force? YES. It is the only <u>operational</u> lighthouse owned by the US Space Force. There are a total of 5 lighthouses located on military installations:, 2 on Navy bases, 2 on Fort Story Virginia, and 1 on a Space Force Base.

Built to aid ships navigating dangerous reefs, it now stands sentry to our celestial travels as rockets are regularly launched nearby. Yes, a UNIQUE lighthouse. I think Cape Canaveral Lighthouse is UNIQUE not only because it is owned by the Space Force, nor because of everything else. But most of all, it has the BEST members, volunteers and sponsors on the planet! Thanks for your help in keeping our light shining into the future. Ron

Museum Highlights

Our 4th Order Fresnel lens on loan from the Coast Guard is on display and ready to view! Check out the photos and additional information throughout this issue of the Beacon. We have ended the Fresnel lens crowd-funding campaign. The final amount received was \$3,796 from 38 donors. This covered 95% of the cost of shipping and display. Thank you all very much – we couldn't have done it without you!

On June 8th, we hosted a tour of 21 participants in a National Park Service Symposium on preserving the artifacts of the Race to Space. They came from all over the country, most having experience managing national historic parks and historic sites, like ours. They loved the lighthouse! One of the visitors had once been responsible for every National Park that has a lighthouse in it, then every Maritime National Park. He was lavish

in his praise of what we've all done with the light station. It was very special to get that type of feedback from someone so knowledgeable. As a further tie-in, he mentioned that Candice Clifford used to work for him. She is one of the authors of "Women Who Kept the Lights", the book upon which our interpretive sign of the same name is based. Small world! Come see our sign and buy her book in the Keeper's Closet. Did You Know?

Our 4th Order Fresnel Lens on loan from the Coast Guard was manufactured circa 1905 by MacBeth-Evans, the first US makers of optical lenses. Most Fresnel lenses were made in France, making our American-made lens very rare.


Becky Zingarelli Museum Director <u>museumdirector@canaverallight.org</u>. On Wednesday, May 3rd, just over three years after we first reached out to the Coast Guard Curator to loan us a 4th Order Fresnel Lens, we finally received it and immediately put it on display. We had a team of dedicated volunteers who had prepared the base to hold this over 500 lb. artifact from circa 1905. Two volunteer lampists supervised the opening of the crate and the monumental task of moving the heavy lens to the base. The lens was placed on its reinforced display base equipped with vibration dampening material to mitigate any potential impacts from rocket launches. The lampists cleaned it and taught retired Coast Guardsman, Jim Jarnac, how to dust it in the future. Jim will be the only one touching the lens.

An interesting fact about these lenses is that the sunlight shining through them can damage the prisms over time but can also cause a build-up of heat and potentially ignite anything flammable on the other side of the focused beam. For that reason, lighthouses with Fresnel lenses have curtains that are kept closed during the day and only opened at night when the lamp is lit. We potentially have the same issue, as our lens is on display next to a sun-facing window. We keep it covered when not on display, have nothing flammable around it and plan to install a blackout shade on the window in the near future, though that will also be open during tours so the lighthouse may be seen in the background.



Cape Family Day Draws Huge Crowd to the Lighthouse

On Saturday, May 13 from 8am to 2pm, the Space Force held their 2023 Family Day. This is the annual opportunity for active-duty military and contractors who work on the Cape to bring their families to see what they do, since the station is otherwise restricted. While individual launch sites and hangars are open throughout the station, the focal point is the lighthouse and Hangar C. Food trucks, bouncy houses, games, and displays lure the vast majority of participants to visit the lighthouse. This year, Space Launch Delta 45 estimates at least 10,000 people visited us! It was beautiful weather and a great time was had by all.


Frank Hodge went on to become the last civilian lighthouse keeper at St. Simon's Island Georgia, before the military took over and he retired.

Volunteer Spotlight on Shane Smith

Whenever the Cape Canaveral Lighthouse Foundation holds the next 5k/10k race at Cape Canaveral Space Force Station, Shane Smith will likely be the lead organizer.

It is only one of the Foundation's fundraising efforts to preserve an important part of the Space Coast's history --- the Cape Canaveral Lighthouse --- in which Smith has been involved.

In 2010, the primary fundraising for the lighthouse was through the sale of bricks that line walkways around the beacon. Smith, the individual mobilization augmentee to the Command Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force Reserve Command, had been advising retired Coast Guard Rear Adm. Bob Merrilees on other options to raise money for the lighthouse. He created the organization's Facebook page and offered other ideas. Merrilees, who was president of the Lighthouse Foundation, then invited him to join the Foundation's board of directors. Since then, Smith has been involved in many other fund-raising events, including races.

Smith served as the Command Chief Master Sergeant of the 920th Rescue Wing at Patrick Air Force base before becoming the individual mobilization augmentee to the Command Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force Reserve Command. In this position he acts on behalf of the Command Chief in his or her absence as the primary advisor regarding welfare, morale, discipline, proper utilization, readiness and warfighting capabilities of the command's 74,000 enlisted Air Force Reserve personnel stationed worldwide. Smith is a highly decorated combat search and rescue and rescue aircraft aircrew evaluator with more than 2,400 flying hours, including 56 combat sorties. He served in Bosnia-Herzegovina, Afghanistan, Iraq and Africa, during Operation Joint Endeavor, Southern Watch, Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

It was on a military aircraft on his way to Kuwait in December 2002, that he met Marian. They have now been married 17 years and have a son, Garrett, who turns 16 in July and will be a sophomore next school year at Melbourne Central Catholic High School. Marian Smith recently retired from the Air Force after 34 years of service.

Shane Smith spearheaded National Solar's effort to strategically plan, develop, finance and build numerous large utility-scale renewable energy power facilities in the South-eastern United States.

Since 2020, he serves as chief financial officer and co-founder of Operator Solutions, which fills a vital role for the human spaceflight program. The company provides rescue capabilities far beyond the typical first responder's and Coast Guard's reach, to areas that require parachute insertion. It provides terrestrial and open ocean rescue of astronauts, citizens and boaters in distress with world class special operators and physicians. Smith, who is now serving as first vice president of the Cape Caperal Lighthouse Foundation, has received numerous military awards and decoration.

This included the crew capsule that will circle the moon and the one that will deliver the first crew of astronauts to descend to the Moon's surface.
